LOS ANGELES, CA - From Thursday, February 13-16th, 2020, artists, collectors, curators and art patrons from all over the world descended into Los Angeles to celebrate the 11th edition of Art Los Angeles Contemporary (ALAC), the premier international art fair of the West Coast at its new location, The Hollywood Athletic Club. Presenting 50 exhibitors from 11 countries, the fair welcomed guests with a curated selection of exhibitors from Los Angeles, as

well as from San Francisco, Portland, New York and Chicago, in addition to international exhibitors from around the world, including Australia, Belgium, Germany, Hong Kong, Japan, Luxembourg, New Zealand, Peru, Poland, Sweden, and the UK.

Tim Fleming, ALAC Director, commented, "We re-opened the club. We set out with immediate trust from our creatives - a collaboration between architecture and design studios Productora from Mexico City and Part Office based in LA and key support from our long standing and recent participating galleries from 11 countries. It's been a real pleasure working within this historic, architectural building and to see how effectively it frames the great new work from both returning and established galleries and from a crop of young, ambitious galleries, that represent the future of what a gallery is in LA."

Strong sales were met with enthusiasm across the board for the bold and visionary move to Hollywood.

Gunia Nowik, Owner, Pola Magnetyczne Gallery commented "We're excited to return to ALAC for a second year and really like this venue and being in Hollywood. It's important for collectors to be able to circulate between all the LA fairs this week and visitors have reacted very well to the venue and history. Our sales have been strong with collectors intrigued with work by Israeli-born, Chicago based artist **Nelly Agassi**, by notable Polish painter **Agata Bogacka**, and French-Polish photographer **Nicolas Grospierre**."

Returning exhibitor **Parisa Kind, Owner, Galerie Parisa Kind**, Frankfurt, Germany, added, "Overall, we had a very successful fair. We sold works by all the artists we presented in the booth, including three large-scale paintings by LA based artist **Ben Echeverria**, as well as paintings by Germany-based artists **Isabelle Fein** and **Hannes Michanek**. We love the new venue – it's incredible. The historical setting juxtaposed with the new architecture of the fair makes it a pleasure to exhibit in. The central location between the various fairs is easily accessible— it's the perfect place to house ALAC."

John McCormack, Co-owner/director Starkwhite added "Art Los Angeles Contemporary raised the bar this year, combining architecture, Hollywood history and contemporary art in a

lively boutique fair held at the magnificent Hollywood Athletic Club. The fair also performed perfectly its core art market role, attracting curators and collectors to the new venue, in sufficient numbers for us to hit our sales target. We sold pieces by all three artists presented in our booth and completely sold out the optically-charged works of Sydney-based artist **Jonny Niesche**."

Guillaume Smets, Owner and Director, Stems Gallery, Brussels and Luxembourg reinforced this sentiment, "We really wanted to have a presence in LA. ALAC was the first and historic fair for contemporary art, and for us it was obvious to exhibit at ALAC. Last year we participated for the first time at the Barker Hangar and we wanted to return a second time to expand our presence among collectors and in the city. The new location at The Hollywood Athletic Club is a visionary move for the fair. It's ideally situated between Felix and Frieze creating a "collectors' triangle" and the set up is both intimate and sociable while providing a classical white wall space for the work. It worked for us – we had very strong sales and we'll return again next year."

Sales of works by established and emerging artists included work by **John Baldessari** at **Mixografia**, **Mary Corse**, **Lita Albuquerque** and **Stephanie Bachiero** at **Peter Blake Gallery**, Canadian artist **Hannah Epstein** at **Steven Turner**, Brooklyn-based artists **Josh Reams** at **Luis de Jesus** and **Tracy Thomason** at **Marinaro**, and six works by Baltimore, MD-born **Coady Brown** at **1969 Gallery**.

For its 11th year, ALACs special programming, highlighted the importance of printed matter and publishing within contemporary art. ALAC 2020 featured four publishers: Case Publishing (Tokyo), OSMOS (NY), Clouds (Auckland), June 20th (Auckland and LA) and Printed Matter (NY), who is the renowned non-profit publisher behind New York Art Book Fair and Los Angeles Art Book Fair. Among ALAC 2020's Special Projects was a presentation by the curatorial platform Court Space, which inhabits Los Angeles's public and private sports courts. In a nod to the athletic history of the Club, artist Gozié Ojini used installation and sculptural works, often repurposing sports gear and equipment as his materials.

Among leading independent art publishers, **Cay Sophie Rabinowitz of OSMOS** enthused, "ALAC continues to present a well-curated selection of publishers featuring bound books end artist editions. This year OSMOS, for its second year at ALAC enjoyed being in the refined architectural space of The Hollywood Athletic Club, and the results exceeded our expectations."

Visitors and patrons alike were upbeat about the fair's guiding role in LA and its new location, "I think you are the beach head that made the case for the viable art market here in LA causing fairs like Frieze and Felix to come after," said **LA artist and visitor**, **Sara Schnadt.**
