First WOPHA Congress: *Women, Photography, and Feminisms* facilitated extraordinary international exchange

Unprecedented platform for women and non-binary artists and scholars leading the sea change in photography's symbiotic relationship to identity and image

The two-day Congress continues with collateral exhibitions, artist residencies and the launch of a new publication

(MIAMI, November 24, 2021)—The organization **Women Photographers International Archive** (WOPHA) has completed its first WOPHA Congress: *Women, Photography, and Feminisms,* a new triennial and precursor to Miami Art Week. The first international convening of its kind, the two-day Congress brought diverse and multidisciplinary thought leaders, artists, curators, scholars, and leading women photography organizations to Miami for a critical convening that created a platform for women and non-binary artists to develop expansive discourses that give prominence to intersectional experiences and perspectives.

The official Congress program took place November 18-19, 2021 at the **Pérez Art Museum Miami**, and virtually with events and exhibits at satellite spaces throughout Miami, including the **Rubell Museum**, **El Espacio 23**, **Green Space Miami**, **The Betsy Hotel** and the **JW Marriott Marquis**.

Miami-based artist, curator, collector, Founder of Arts Connection Foundation and WOPHA Congress speaker **Andreina Fuentes Angarita** stated the importance of this opportunity for visibility of Miami's art scene, "we are showing that Miami is more than a destination for Art Basel, we are showing that Miami is a site for cultural change."

PAMM Director **Franklin Sirmans** contextualized the significance of the ambitious Congress and its burgeoning international conversations alongside watershed moments like the *1993 Whitney Biennial*, the 1994 exhibition *Black Male: Representations of Masculinity in Contemporary American Art* and the 2000 Queens Museum's *Global Conceptualism: Points of Origin, 1950s-1980s,* which also traveled to PAMM. "These are the kinds of exhibitions that expanded canons — just like this project is doing," said Sirmans.

Amongst the many critical conversations covering topics of visibility and work to expand and carry more inclusive practices around language, politics, research, and cultural production, there were poignant threads of women and non-binary artists of color feeling invisible, anonymous, and unseen. In the panel titled, *On Feminist Curating of Women Photographer's Work*, **Abby Chen**, Senior Associate Curator at the Asian Art Museum of San Francisco, stated the importance of asking, "What is the systemic block that is causing women not to be seen?" Chen continued, "congresses like WOPHA are crucial to build networks and circulate work."

The Congress further extends with collateral exhibitions on view through Miami Art Week and the new year.

The exhibition <u>Female in Focus</u>, brings together a highly-anticipated presentation of works by the winners of this year's prestigious Female in Focus photography competition established by **1854 Media** and **British Journal of Photography**. Co-curated by WOPHA and curated by Héloise Winstone and Aldeide Delgado. The exhibition runs through January 18, 2022, at Green Space Miami, 7200 Biscayne Blvd. Miami, FL 33138.

The exhibition <u>FloodZone</u> is an exhibition of an expansive and ongoing photographic series by **Anastasia Samoylova**, responding to the environmental changes in coastal cities of South Florida. *FloodZone* is on view through April 17, 2022 at the HistoryMiami Museum, 101 West Flagler Street, Miami, FL 33130.

The organization is currently documenting the diverse artistic production of Latin American and Latinx communities, including photographers from Mexico, Central and South America, the Caribbean, and artists of Latin American descent living and working in the United States.

Aldeide Delgado, a Cuban-born, Miami-based independent Latinx art historian and curator, is the founder & director of Women Photographers International Archive (WOPHA). Delgado studies, publishes on, and curates from feminist and decolonial perspectives on crucial topics of the history of photography and abstraction within Latin American, Caribbean, and Latinx contexts. Notably, she has lectured on the significance and subversive nature of international women photography collectives and marginalized identities in the arts at the Tate Modern, Pérez Art Museum Miami (PAMM), DePaul Art Museum, King's College London, California Institute of the Arts (CalArts), and The New School. Delgado is a recipient of a 2019 Knight Arts Challenge Award by the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, the 2018 School of Art Criticism Fellowship by SAPS - La Tallera, and a 2017 Research and Production of Critic Essay Fellowship by TEOR/éTica. Prior to founding WOPHA, Delgado created the online feminist archive Catalog of Cuban Women Photographers, the first comprehensive survey of Cuban photography history highlighting women's contributions from the nineteenth century to the present. She is an active member of PAMM's International Women's Committee and PAMM's Latin American and Latinx Art Fund, US Latinx Art Forum, and the steering committee of the Feminist Art Coalition.
